2018: A YEAR IN REVIEW

Last year was a busy, productive and successful one. Missions, meetings and engagement with national teams in all 10 ASEAN countries have provided a solid platform that has informed future project activity and set the team up nicely for work in 2019 and beyond. December 2018 – Lao PDR - Annual Steering Committee



The Landmark Mekong Hotel in Vientiane, Laos, provided the backdrop for the 2nd Steering Committee meeting chaired by DEVCO Project Officer, Ms Silvia Bottone



In attendance was the Deputy Head of Regional Secretariat, General Ke Da, representatives from SEA Regional Secretariat, National Focal Points and delegates from all 10 Partner Countries.

A review of the first phase of Project 61 followed by a plan for the delivery of phase 2, moving into 2019, was presented by WP leaders who outlined their plans for training programmes and in-country missions in the year ahead. 5 Partner Countries signed off their approval of the plans, and it is hoped that the other 5 will do so soon.

2019: The YEAR AHEAD

To date, 2019 may seem a little quiet but, as planned, during the first half of the year, the Consortium Team is busy:

- making the logistics arrangements for training courses and awareness raising activities in all 10 Partner Countries and;
- Designing the content of those activities to meet the needs of each Partner Country in the Project.

P61 activities will kick off in June 2019 with a European Study Visit for SEA National Emergency Response Planners who will experience European Best Practice in the management of chemicals and their associated wastes and develop guidelines on how to clearly define responsibilities amongst national services, avoiding overlapping mandates.

This will be followed by regional and national training events across the region. The full programme can be found at the end of this newsletter.

The activities planned for each work package are briefly described below.

WP1 Legal

The activities under Work Package 1 focus on the legal aspects of chemicals management. During Phase 1 of the Project, which consisted of Fact-Finding Visits, we gathered information on Partner Countries' national legal frameworks concerning chemicals. We collected laws and regulations and discussed the comprehensiveness of such legislation, including with respect to international obligations and standards.

Since the Steering Committee Meeting in December 2018, VERTIC (the lead organisation on Work Package) has been



designing templates for legislation surveys. These templates are our methodology to analyse the legislation and regulations together with the Partner Countries and to identify areas for improvement.

Whilst no events will be organised under Work Package 1, VERTIC will be in communication with each Partner Country to develop country-specific analyses, such as the omnibus legislation surveys covering the Partner Countries' national legislation for the implementation of multiple international instruments on chemicals.

In addition, VERTIC will cooperate with the Partner Countries on the development of regional analyses, including regional legal mechanisms to manage chemicals, their wastes, and chemical facilities.

Finally, together with PHE, VERTIC will present the 'international legal framework for chemicals workshop' during the Regional Workshop in Lao PDR in July 2019.

WP3 Laboratories

Here in the Netherlands, our team of experts started with the shaping of a regional training course. The set-up of the training will be a 5-day session during which different modules will be provided. The itinerary contains a mix of lectures, assignments and (tabletop) exercises. Two experts from each of the participating countries will be sponsored by the project to attend the training, which will most likely be in Singapore. Preliminary dates (8-12 and 19-25 July) and venue are currently under discussion.

Since the Steering Committee meeting, progress has been made on several topics that will be in the sessions, such as handheld equipment, GCMS & LCMS introductions, and forensic aspects. Additional topics that will be addressed in the training include ISO 17025; (laboratory) waste

management; (agent related)



new developments; tips and tricks for buying equipment; and handling unknown samples. Tabletop exercises will also be prepared so that knowledge gained by the participants can be put into practice during discussions about potential real-life events.

WP4 Preparedness and Response

Here in the Slovak Republic our experts have been working on the upcoming Study visit and planned national training courses that begin later this year. Study visit is 03/06/2019 to07/06/2019 in Czech Republic and Slovak Republic with the aim to inform selected experts of best practice from the EU, in multiagency cooperation in the management of chemicals and their associated wastes, focused on emergency response in the case of chemical incidents. W will hold a workshop to develop guidelines on how best to clearly define responsibilities amongst national services, avoiding overlapping mandates.

The content of national training has been finalized and our experts are currently developing supporting documents like presentations, lessons plan templates and videos for interactive activities. It will be most important to select the right participants for the study Visit and the national training courses. In addition, we have been working on brochures, flyers and poster for raising awareness with respect to the human and environmental effects of mismanaged chemicals and their associated wastes.

WP2 Prevention and WP5 Recovery

Here in the UK we have been developing the first Regional workshops covering several key topic areas such as International legal frameworks, regional cross border chemical incidents and national chemical risk assessment. These events will be delivered in Vientiane,

Lao PDR between the 2nd and 10th July 2019. Several participants from each Partner Country will be sponsored to attend the workshop. WE hope that a mix of presentations, interactive activities and chemical incident scenarios will ensure the workshops are engaging and productive for all delegates. We would like to express our particular thanks to Lao PDR for hosting these workshops.

Together with our colleagues from ISEMI (WP4 leaders) we are continuing to develop material for the National Training workshops, to be delivered in each Partner Country commencing in September 2019.
